The Bart Rispens Research Award

The Bart Rispens Research Award is financially supported by MSD Animal Health.

> This Award was established in 1973 in memory of the Dutch poultry veterinarian Dr Bart Rispens, due to the initiative of his former colleague Dr Henk Maas. The main goal of the fund was to honour the great contribution of Dr Rispens to the control of Marek's disease.


Marek's vaccine CVI988, which was developed as part of the research of Dr Rispens, is successfully used to prevent Marek's disease in poultry all over the world. The vaccine had been made available to the vaccine industry free of charge only because of the attitude of Dr Rispens towards commercialisation of research subsidised by the government.

The Award will be given biennially to the first author of the best paper published in the WVPA's journal, Avian Pathology, during the two calendar years preceding the Award presentation at the WVPA Congress.

The recipient of the Award is elected by the Dr Bart Rispens Research Award Committee, which includes representatives of the Board of the WVPA, a representative of Avian Pathology, a representative of the corporate sponsor and four other appointed scientists.

The winner will be presented with a medallion, a certificate and a monetary award.

Avian Pathology Lecture Award

The Avian Pathology Lecture Award, sponsored by The Houghton Trust, is presented at each WVPA congress. The award is made to a young scientist who has made major contributions to the field of poultry disease research to enable them to give a keynote lecture, The Avian Pathology Lecture, at the WVPA's global congress.

The award comprises payment of the costs to attend the congress at which the lecture is given, together with the presentation of an engraved award.

Nominations for the Avian Pathology Lecturer can be made in two ways – either by the Corresponding Secretary of a National Branch of the WVPA or by an individual member of the WVPA.

The maximum age of candidates is 45 at the time of the relevant congress.

Unsuccessful candidates may be renominated on a subsequent occasion, provided they still meet the necessary requirements.

The selection process is currently under review and so the process to nominate the lecturer for the XXth World Veterinary Poultry Association Congress, to be held in Edinburgh in 2017, will be delayed until after the Cape Town Congress in 2015.

However, in general terms, Officers of the WVPA, after due consultation, will make a short-list of six candidates, which will then be forwarded to the Grants Subcommittee of the Houghton Trust, who will choose the Avian Pathology Lecturer.

The Young Poultry Veterinarian Award

This Award is supported by Zoetis and is currently called The WVPA-Zoetis Young Poultry Veterinarian Award.

This Award was launched in 2012 and is presented annually to a young poultry

veterinarian (under 35) who is seen to be a credit to the profession, who is an ambassador and a communicator and who would be seen as a worthy winner by all sections of the poultry industry. The Award is judged by a panel of five members of the WVPA and is led by an officer of WVPA. This panel shall have a broad base and be balanced in its composition.

The recipient of the Award receives \$US5,000 which is to be used to attend scientific meetings in order to further develop their professional knowledge.

The WVPA Young Veterinarian of the Year Award is presented at the WVPA's biannual congress and at a suitable alternative meeting in the intervening years – this is currently the WVPA Asia Meeting. The Innovation in Vaccination Award

This award is currently supported by Merial and is known as The WVPA-Merial Innovation in Vaccination Award.

This Award was launched in 2015 and will be presented at each global WVPA Congress to a poultry veterinarian or avian health scientist for an outstanding contribution in the field of innovation in poultry vaccination.

The Award is judged by a panel of representatives from WVPA and Merial and is chaired by an officer of the WVPA.

The recipient of the Award receives €5,000 to help fund his/her ongoing professional development or training as well as a suitable memento of the occasion.

Austria

Similar to previous years, the first meeting of the Austrian poultry sector took place early in January during the ecosocial forum in a small village in the southeast of the country. This annual meeting is supposed to link agriculture and veterinary medicine resulting in a high number of participants from all sectors, especially farmers. Animal welfare and economic issues were the most important issues. A single talk about campylobacter concluded the meeting.

A special event was once again the meeting of the Association to promote Research in Poultry Science (VAG), which was held in April and organised as a two-day meeting outside Vienna at Lake Neusiedl.

Parasitic diseases were selected as the general topic of the event. The first presentation was given by D. Liebhart from the Poultry Clinic at the Veterinary University in Vienna who gave an overview about important parasitic diseases in poultry.

This subject was further highlighted by two practitioners, A. Hemme from Germany and P. Mitsch, who talked about parasitic diseases in layers, broilers and broiler breeders. The subject was concluded by S. Spiess from MSD Germany who outlined recent progress in licensing a new anti-parasitic product.

In the afternoon a wine tasting was extensively used to deepen individual

subjects and in the evening a dinner was held which featured local delicacies. The night ended, for various participants, at the hotel bar leading to certain side effects the next day!

The second day focused on gut health and

started off with M. Hess who gave an

overview on infectious agents with relevance for gut health in turkeys. The benefit and practical application of competitive exclusion was highlighted by C. Schneitz from Orion Pharma, Finland.

The session was concluded by J. D. van Klis from Delacon Biotechnik, Austria, who

focused on intestinal health problems in meat-type poultry and the options of nutritional interventions.

In June, another meeting of the Austrian poultry veterinarians will take place adjacent to the 250th anniversary of the University of Veterinary Medicine in Vienna.

Beside early sex determination in ovo, the meeting will concentrate on viral diseases, especially infectious bronchitis and adenoviral gizzard erosion.

Belgium

The Belgian branch of WVPA organised four national symposia in 2014. Each of these was attended by 40-60 veterinarians active in the poultry health sector.

On January 23rd we organised a symposium on the use of antibiotics in poultry. This was in close collaboration with AMCRA.

AMCRA is a centre of expertise, national joint initiative of government, poultry business, pharma industry and academia, aiming at collecting and spreading information on the proper use of antibiotics and taking initiatives for the reduction of usage in animal production.

A major part of the symposium was devoted to reporting and discussing previous and forthcoming initiatives of AMCRA.

In addition, Dr Katie Vermeersch from the Federal Agency for the Safety of the Food Chain reported on the present status of antibiotic resistance in bacterial isolates from farm animals at national and European level. All in all, the conclusion of this meeting was positive, as there is a spectacular negative trend in antibiotic use in farm animals in general and in poultry in particular in Belgium.

On April 23rd, another hot topic with respect to poultry health was tackled, namely how to control dermanyssus in layers. On this occasion, Prof. Luc Thiry from Ghent University reported on the results of a national scientific research project aimed at the development of an integrated control strategy for dermanyssus. The idea was to permanently reduce populations of these noxious organisms below an economically

acceptable threshold using a combination of methods, including a minimum of chemical compounds. He envisaged heat treatment of the layer house after depopulation, adaptations to the housing system so as to minimise hiding places, silica, plant extracts, traps, entomophagic fungi and finally, predator mites. At this same symposium, Dr Alasdair Nisbet from Moredun Research, Scotland, reported on the development of a revolutionary new vaccine against red mites. Research on delivery systems for the vaccine is in progress.

On June 19th, a symposium was devoted entirely to alternatives to antibiotics for use in poultry. The first speaker was Dr Wim Nuboer from Micreos, a Dutch company specialising in phage application in animal husbandry, giving an overview of the past, present and future of phage therapy.

The second speaker was Dr Leen Timbermont from Ghent University, giving an overview on the use of bacteriocines as alternatives to antibiotics. The third speaker was Dr Hilde Van Meirhaeghe from Vetworks, a poultry health service and consultancy company. She reported on the use of short chain and medium chain fatty acids as alternatives to antibiotics, with emphasis on practical experience. Finally, the undersigned gave an overview on the use of prebiotics and probiotics.

In all of these presentations, emphasis was clearly on applications for the control of intestinal health and zoonoses, especially in broilers, as these appear to be the two areas most critical to poultry production at present.

The last symposium of 2014 was devoted entirely to the present situation regarding infectious bronchitis in Europe. Dr Jane Cook, now consultant microbiologist from Huntingdon, UK, gave an interesting talk on practical aspects of how to control IB variants. Dr Mieke Steensel for the Central Veterinary Institute (CODA) in Brussels reported on the COST action (FA1207) for coordinated control of avian coronaviruses in Europe. Finally, Dr Sjaak De Wit from GD Deventer, The Netherlands, gave a very in depth talk about pathogenicity and tropism of IB strains worldwide, focusing on molecular analyses of genetic variation that underscore the diverse clinical manifestations of this viral disease.

Israel

The 50th Annual Convention of the WPSA Israel Branch held a joint meeting with the WVPA Branch.

This year the members of WPSA met to celebrate their 50 Year Anniversary. The members of the WPSA are specialists in all fields: farmers, agronomists, scientists, nutrition specialists, veterinary specialists in poultry diseases, and members of the WVPA.

The Israel Branch of WPSA welcomed the distinguished guests Prof. Paul Siegel, Virginia Tech University, USA, Dr Lesley Larkin, UK, and Prof. Ted Aplgeit, Purdue University, USA.

The program was divided into sessions on layers, turkeys, and a round table discussion about the future of broiler chickens, nutrition and heavy breeders.

One day was dedicated to poultry health. Most of the WVPA members attended this session.

The lectures included the following topics: Inclusion body hepatitis – isolations of the virus in the years 2012-2015. New infection laryngotracheitis vaccine (ILT) screening with the help of the feather method.

• A report of high mortality in broiler chickens as a result of infection by Clostridium perfringens.

• Outbreak of avian influenza subtype H5N1

The virus subtype H5N1 returned to Israel on January 16th, 2015. The previous break was in April 2012. At the time of this conference, eight foci of outbreaks had occurred in Israel and in the Palestinian Authority. The infection appeared in meatturkey houses, heavy breeder houses and another poultry house of table egg layers. In addition, an infected wild bird was found (Vanellus spinosus).

Analysis of all the phylogenetic findings of the current outbreak and their comparison to world and regional viruses, and virulence indices of the viruses were presented at the conference.

Additional news from Israel

The family and friends of Dr Oded Pleser, the head of the Poultry Disease Laboratory in

Jerusalem who was killed in 1973, organised a very well attended scientific meeting in his honour. The scientific program included:

 A lecture about the Ebola virus, presented by Dr Ran Nir-Paz, from the department of Clinical Microbiology and Infectious Diseases, the Medical Centre HADASA in Jerusalem.

• Outbreak of Avian Influenza H5N1 in Israel in January 2015 presented by Dr Michal Pery-Markovic, epidemiologist of the State Veterinary Services.

• Trials to reduce the contamination of growing broiler chickens by salmonella bacterias. The lecturer was Dr Orit Maman from the Northern Poultry Diseases Laboratory.

Italy

On April 16th and 17th, the Italian branch held the 54th National Conference of the Società Italiana di Patologia Aviare (Italian Society of Avian Pathology) in Forlì.

The first day focused on the health status concerning Italian breeding farms and the major diseases diagnosed throughout 2014. Dr Gavazzi (Amadori group) explained the main diseases of chicken meat, Prof. Camarda (Università di Bari) spoke about the health conditions concerning laying hens, Dr Da Ros (Amadori group) spoke about the main pathologies found in meat turkey, and Dr Scolari presented his report on the minor species (guinea fowl, duck, pheasant, etc).

Dr Terregino (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale delle Venezie) concluded with an update on AI and Newcastle disease. The reports showed an overall calm national health picture without showing any critical signs within the Italian poultry industry.

On April 17th, the Conference held discussions on the 'Territorial management of avian diseases' featuring five reports. The first report was presented by Dr Calistri (National Reference Center for Veterinary Epidemiology, Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale dell'Abruzzo e del Molise 'G. Caporale') who spoke about the epidemiological surveillance systems for infectious diseases related to poultry. Following this, Dr Bonfanti (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale delle Venezie) presented her report on a typical example of disease management speaking about the case of avian influenza. Dr Moreno (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale della Lombardia ed Emilia Romagna) continued with another practical example of disease management at regional level speaking about avian laryngotracheitis. Dr Catania (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale delle Venezie) presented a report on the management of mycoplasmi, while Dr Farioli (Lombardy Region) concluded the conference talking about the role of the public veterinary system (State Veterinary) in the management of diseases. Within the context of the two conventions and in the afternoon of April 17th, 21 scientific papers were presented by the members.

The election of the new Board of Italian Society of Avian Pathology, which will take office from 2016-2018, also took place during this conference. All members of the board were renewed and newly elected members were: Davide Giovanardi (Veronesi group), Rossella Pedicone (Unaitalia), Salvatore Catania (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale delle Venezie), Mattia Cecchinato (Università di Padova), Ferdinando Battistoni (Amadori group), Giovanni Tosi (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale della Lombardia ed Emilia Romagna), Ana Moreno (Istituto Zooprofilattico Sperimentale della Lombardia

Pakistan

A total of 200 participants, including all the WVPA Pakistan members, avian health professionals from the public and private sector and postgraduate students of the Department of Pathology attended.

In the inaugural session Prof. Dr Ahrar Khan, Chairman, Department of Pathology, welcomed the participants and chief guest Prof. Dr Iqrar Ahmad Khan, Vice Chancellor of the University of Agriculture, Faisalabad.

He appreciated the professional activity organised by the Department of Pathology in

collaboration with WVPA and highlighted the role of the poultry industry in the national economy of Pakistan. The Dean, Faculty of Veterinary Science, Prof. Dr Zafar Iqbal thanked the participants. Dr Muhammad Kashif Saleemi, Secretary WVPA Pakistan, moderated all the sessions.

In the first technical session two lectures were delivered. The first lecture was delivered by Dr Mustafa Kamal, member WVPA Pakistan and Chairman Pakistan Poultry Association, who has a wealth of experience on modern ventilation for environmentally controlled houses. He is also technical head of Hubbard's grandparent poultry project in Pakistan. His title was 'Poor ventilation and ammonia toxicity: a risk factor for emergence of respiratory diseases'.

The second lecture was delivered by Prof. Hafez Mohamed Hafez, Head, Institute of Poultry Diseases, Free University, Berlin (Vice President WVPA) on Skype from Jordan. His title was 'Respiratory diseases of poultry: diagnosis and control.'

After the first technical session, the annual branch meeting of WVPA Pakistan was chaired by the President of WVPA Pakistan,

Dr Yasser is also the President of the WPSA branch in Iraq (since 2013) and head of the Veterinary Syndicate in Karbala.

Sister branches

As was previously reported in Aerosols, countries in southern Africa that do not have enough poultry veterinarians are now forming 'sister branches' under the auspices of the South African branch of the WVPA. Sister branches are already in existence in Botswana, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

The poultry veterinary



Cape Town is awaiting the poultry veterinary fraternity for the World Veterinary Poultry Association's congress to take place from 7-11th September 2015. With the untimely passing of the WVPA President, Trevor Bagust, the Local Organising Committee of the WVPAC2015 decided to dedicate this congress in his honour and we will host his wife, Joanne Bagust as our guest of honour. This congress promises to be a memorable experience with a scientific program covering a broad range of topics as well as opportunities for social and tourism experiences during the visit to South Africa.

South Africa as a destination

South Africa has recently been named as one of the top 50 most tourist-friendly countries in the world, in a recent Travel and Tourism Competitiveness Report by the World Economic Forum. The aerial approach to Cape Town's International Airport offers a spectacular view over the Atlantic Ocean and the iconic Table Mountain, and has been named the 10th most scenic landing strip in the world by a global booking platform for private jets.

Scientific programme

The scientific committee, chaired by Dr Carine Pienaar with advisor Professor Dick Jones, had the huge task of selecting suitable abstracts for oral presentations and posters with the aim of ensuring a balanced programme. This program caters for all poultry health professionals including, poultry veterinarians from academia, poultry health researchers and poultry veterinarians in practice.

21 plenary sessions are included with keynote speakers from across the globe.

Experts from the USA, UK, RSA, Austria, Germany, Belgium, Bangladesh, Thailand, Mozambique and others will be presenting on a variety of topics. Themes include viral and bacterial diseases, immunity and immune suppression (viruses and mycotoxins), gut health and diseases, parasites, public health / food safety, ratite, turkey and duck diseases, aspects of poultry management (including welfare and disaster management), therapeutics and antibiotic resistance.

Two sessions are dedicated to small scale/backyard farming and case reports from poultry veterinarians who are active in the field.

A first for WVPA congresses will be an interactive electronic poster wall with posters presented in electronic format – no more scrolls in carry-on luggage.

The digital posters will also be available to congress delegates which means no need for taking pictures of posters to try and read later.

Workshops

Two separate workshops will be hosted on the Monday afternoon preceding the congress with the topics: 'Diagnostic Pathology of Poultry Diseases: A Review' and 'Writing Scientific papers: How to please editors, reviewers and readers'.



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Poultry health course online

Following over 40 years of successful delivery as a face-to-face course by the UK's leading experts in poultry health, microbiology and virology, the Poultry Health Course, which has been running at The Institute for Animal Health, Compton Laboratory for the last 20 years, is entering a new phase of development.

Compton, and now the IAH Pirbright Laboratory (now Pirbright Institute), have entered into partnership with the University of Nottingham to develop an entirely online version of the poultry health course. This course contains the same learning outcomes and content as the residential course, is delivered by the same leading experts, and features a series of interactive tutorials to help reinforce students' learning.

The partnership has been able to utilise funding from the AgriFood Advanced Training Partnership grant provided by UK Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council (BBSRC) for the development of post-graduate training courses for AgriFood sectors.

The original Poultry Health Course was and remains a residential course involving a series of more than 38 lectures presented by 29 international experts in their own fields, over a two week period. The course typically comprises lectures on major non-infectious and infectious diseases and the associated pathogens together with problems in production and in individual sectors and approaches to disease control. In addition, practical tuition is provided in laboratory techniques, post-mortem analysis and vaccination equipment.

The course has been designed to meet the needs of veterinary surgeons and poultry, feed and pharmaceutical professionals who will lead the poultry industry in the future.

Most delegates hail from the UK but the world of poultry medicine and science is becoming increasingly a global enterprise with centres of production moving towards Asia and South America. There is thus potentially huge scope for widening international participation and discussion in the course through its translation to an online format.

Students can elect to study the course either through the residential or online pathway. The residential course will be held in spring as usual in all probability during the month of April in 2016.

The online course will be rolled out for the

first time in early October 2015. Lectures will be released sequentially over an eight month period until May 2016.

The course can be attended as a part of continuing professional development (CPD) course with delegates receiving a certificate of attendance. Students can also opt to sit an exam which will allow entry into a series of additional courses including poultry production, poultry business management and poultry nutrition, leading to a Postgraduate Certificate in Poultry Health and Production

Frank Jordan (1917-2015)

Frank T. W. Jordan

Professor Frank Jordan BSc, PhD, DSc, DPMP, FRCVS, the eminent poultry veterinarian and academic, died on 9th January 2015 at the age of 97.

Frank was born in Newport in Monmouthshire, South Wales in 1917 and was always proud of his Welsh heritage.

Frank qualified in 1941 at the Royal Veterinary College, London with a BSc

in Veterinary Science and Membership of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (MRCVS). He spent his final two undergraduate years in Berkshire, having been evacuated due to the London Blitz.

There were few jobs in veterinary practice available then, but Frank worked as a farm labourer for a few months until he found employment in a mixed practice in York. Here he gained useful experience but soon volunteered for military service and became a Captain in the Royal Army Veterinary Corps which took him to Burma.

After his war service, and teaching briefly at the Royal Veterinary College, Frank worked in a mixed practice until 1949 when he became an Assistant Veterinary Investigation Officer at MAFF Aberystwyth. Here he became particularly interested in poultry diseases but somewhat frustrated at not being able to follow-up investigations to define the causes.

After joining the University of Liverpool Veterinary School in 1952 as a lecturer, he was able to initiate his research at Leahurst Campus. Frank was awarded his PhD (London) in 1954 and became a Fellow of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (FRCVS) in 1955. Later in his career he was also awarded his DSc (London, 1970) and, after helping to establish the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS) Diploma in Poultry Medicine and Production as Chairman of the RCVS Poultry Specialisation Board (1987), he was among its first recipients. This was followed by two years serving as Chairman of its examinations subcommittee.

In the early days at Liverpool, Frank was one of the few academics at the time who considered poultry diseases to be worthy of study and research. Alone, he obtained funding from the then Agricultural Research Council and the British Egg Marketing Board to establish at Leahurst a dedicated research laboratory building, animal house facilities and a team of research staff. The research unit opened in 1966 and, following his official retirement in 1985, the laboratory building was renamed the Jordan Building. The work of this initially small group comprised research on poultry diseases and lecturing on these topics to veterinary undergraduates.

In 1973, a one-year taught MVSc course in Avian Medicine was established by Frank to train veterinarians from all over the world in poultry diseases and it ran for 11 years. The course also proved to be an excellent recruiting ground for PhD research candidates.

Frank's main research interests were in poultry respiratory diseases and he focused initially on infectious laryngotracheitis and then mycoplasmosis and other agents involved in chronic respiratory disease. Together with his colleagues, the research output of the group numbered more than 500 publications and put the University on the world map in terms of poultry disease research.

Frank delivered numerous invited talks at prestigious conferences in many different countries. He also undertook study leave and advisory work in various countries and was in the USA in 1963 at the time when President John F Kennedy was assassinated and in 1984 he was helping PhD students in Tripoli when the UK severed diplomatic relations with Libya. He certainly had his share of adventures!

Frank was an inspiring teacher, never happier than being with students in a chicken house, sniffing the atmosphere for ammonia or delving in carcases in the post-mortem room pointing out a swollen bursa or necrotic enteritis. He also gave lectures on poultry diseases, by invitation, to students at Bristol, Glasgow and Edinburgh Veterinary Schools and at the Institute for Animal Health, Compton.

He edited several editions of the classic text Poultry Diseases which enhanced his international fame. The book has been used as a standard all over the world where students learn about poultry.

Frank still found time to be President of the British Veterinary Poultry Association, President of the Association of Veterinary Teachers and Research Workers and a member of several University and Government committees and visiting groups. He held office in the International

Organisation for Mycoplasmology and travelled as an advisor on behalf of the World Health Organisation.

Frank officially retired in 1985 and, rather remarkably, was co-author on at least 18 publications after retirement. He continued to work in the Jordan building at the Leahurst Campus until he was in his late eighties and was highly regarded by both established and newer poultry researchers as their guru. His final two papers were published when he was 88 and 91 years of age.

In recognition of his achievements Frank was elected an Honorary Life Member of the World Veterinary Poultry Association (WVPA) in 1983. He was awarded the Gordon Memorial Trust Lecture and Medal in 1985 'in recognition of distinguished contributions to poultry science'. In the same year he was elected as a Life Member of the British Veterinary Poultry Association and in 1995 he was awarded the Poultry Industry Award for lifetime services to the poultry industry. In 1993 he was appointed MBE in recognition of his 'services to veterinary medicine'.

In 2013, the President of the WVPA (the late Dr Trevor Bagust) visited Frank's residential home in Delph to deliver in person a certificate and speech to induct him as one of the first 52 members of the WVPA Hall of Honour for 'exceptional contribution to the WVPA and the world of poultry health management'.

Ahmed Ali Sami Ahmed

It is with great sadness that we inform you of the death of our friend, colleague and mentor Prof. Dr Ahmed Ali Sami Ahmed who passed away on the 3rd March 2015 at the age of 81.

Professor Ahmed Sami was born on 20th October 1933 in El-Minia Province, Egypt. In 1958 he obtained his veterinary degree from the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, Cairo University.

He completed his Dr medicinae veterinariae at the Department of Poultry Diseases, Giessen University, Germany, and in 1971 he successfully completed his Dr habilitatus thesis at the Department of Poultry Diseases, University of Munich.

In 1958, he joined the staff of the Department of Poultry Diseases at Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, Cairo University and became Professor in 1976. Then he was named as the Dean of the then newly established Faculty of Veterinary Medicine, Alexandria University, Egypt.

From 1979 to 1982, he served as Professor of Poultry diseases at the Faculty of Veterinary science, King Faisal University, Saudi Arabia. He returned back to Alexandria University in Egypt and served as the head of Department of Poultry Diseases until his retirement and became an Emeritus Professor in 1994.

Professor Ahmed Sami established the Egyptian branch of the World Veterinary Poultry Association (WVPA) in 1986 and served as president until 2006. He organised the XII World Congress of the WVPA that was held in 2002 in Cairo, Egypt.

From 1997 to 2005 he served as Vice President of the WVPA; and in 2005 he was named as Honorary Life president of WVPA. In 2013 he was selected for the WVPA Hall of Honour.


His contributions to poultry veterinary science were recognised by numerous awards from industry, academia and government. He served as a scientific advisor for several poultry companies in Egypt and several Middle Eastern countries.

Over the past 50 years, he was selected to chair most, if not all of governmental committees related to poultry diseases and production in Egypt. His knowledge and expertise were instrumental to the enhancement and growth of the poultry industry in Egypt and the Middle East.

Professor Ahmed Sami's career has focused on diagnosis and control of poultry diseases, with particular emphasis on respiratory and foodborne diseases. He has published numerous papers in peer-reviewed journals and supervised more than 50 post-graduate students. He is best known for his work on Newcastle disease, infectious bronchitis and adenovirus infections, but has also worked on bacterial and parasitic diseases of chickens, duck and geese.

He will be missed by poultry specialists of the World Veterinary Poultry Association, as his contributions will not be forgotten. We will remember Professor Ahmed Sami for his long lasting, valuable contributions to academia, teaching, and research that supported the poultry industry in the Middle East.
